1.2 Staffing:

One full time member (Manager) and two-part time staff members. Volunteers are utilised to enhance services periodically but to Covid 19 this was not possible in 2020. An extra staff member was employed two days a week to look after Kilkenny and Wexford VIS until they opened as a Centre in 2021.

1.3 Area Profile: -



Carlow County is an inland county, measuring 896 sq. km in area, located in the South East Region, and bordered by Counties Wicklow, Wexford, Kilkenny, Laois, and Kildare. Carlow Volunteer Centre serves the county-wide area — a population of 56,932. The population density for County Carlow of 56.4 people per sq. km remains below the national average of 60.6, thus indicating a relatively high level of population dispersal in the County. This suggests a likelihood of social issues related to rural isolation and impacts on the ability of isolated people to become involved in formal voluntary activity based within the urban centers. This is exacerbated by the poor public transport within the county, especially in rural areas.

Carlow has a higher level of social housing provision than most other Irish counties — the fifth highest proportion among Ireland's thirty-one local authorities. In respect of family cycle, Carlow has a higher proportion of households with preadolescent and adolescent children than is the case nationally, and the county-level data, suggest that this demographic bulge is not being sustained, as the proportion of pre-family households is below the State average. Like most of Ireland, Carlow is becoming increasingly diverse in respect of nationalities,

ethnicity, and languages. Non-Irish nationals and those with dual nationality account for 12% of the county's population. There are notable micro-level geographies associated with the distribution of foreign-born persons. Tullow and Carrickduff have notable concentrations of Poles, while Myshall has the highest proportion of Lithuanians among its resident population. Polish, French and Latvian are the most widely spoken foreign languages in Carlow. While foreign-born persons are distributed across most of Carlow's towns and villages, Ireland's largest ethnic minority, Irish Travellers are concentrated; the settlements with the highest proportions of Travellers in the resident population are Carrickduff and Tullow.

The Haase-Pratschke Index of Affluence and Deprivation reveals that Carlow is less socially polarised than are most other Irish counties. While there are pockets of affluence, over three-quarters of Electoral Divisions (EDs) in Carlow record scores on this Index that are 'marginally below average' and a further 7% are classified as 'disadvantaged'. A micro-geographical analysis of affluence and deprivation reveals that a number of neighbourhoods in Carlow Town and Hacketstown are classified as 'very disadvantaged.'

2. Introduction

Carlow Volunteer Centre offers support and guidance to individuals and Volunteer Involving Organisations (VIOs) to reach their individual and collective goals while making a significant contribution to their local community and society.

This report outlines the work and highlights the achievements of Carlow Volunteer Centre (CVC) in 2020. Along with Co. Carlow, CVC were tasked with looking after Volunteers, Volunteer Involving Organisations and the I-Vol database for Kilkenny and Wexford VIS until they become Volunteer Centres in 2021.

CVC employs three staff, one full time and two on a part-time basis. For 2020 an extra staff member was contracted to work part time to help with the extra workload with the two extra Counties. Together they offer support and guidance to individuals and Volunteer-Involving- Organisations (VIOs).

CVC currently works with 399 VIOs offering them a range of services. In addition, CVC works with over 1,200 active volunteers in Carlow, is part of a national network of volunteer centres and works closely with other organisations in the county including Carlow Public Participation Network, Carlow County Council, and both local partnership companies.

With the arrival of COVID-19, how CVC offered their services had to change from meetings, outreaches and presentations in person to the delivery of all services using technology. This required a steep learning curve as all staff had to learn how to use a range of new programmes

such as What's App, ZOOM, Microsoft Teams, Eventbrite and many more. In addition to this learning curve, it was recognised by the Manager and staff of CVC that keeping in regular contact with both volunteers and VIOs would be essential to the continued support of the sector, while also ensuring the CVC played its part in the community response to COVID-19. It was agreed CVC would:

- Update VIO's on the latest news from the HSE, Health and Safety Authority, Carlow County Council and other sources through emails, coffee mornings and our Social Media Channels.
- Continue our advertisement in the Carlow Nationalist and our Social media platform outlining new volunteering opportunities and thanking volunteers for their interest.
- Contact and supporting new community groups which sprang up in response to COVID-19, many of whom did not understand the importance of volunteer screening and management.
- Work closely with Carlow County Council on the Community Response Team to help identify and ameliorate community issues caused by COVID-19, such as food poverty, isolation and the digital divide.
- Liaise with all registered VIOs to help them deliver their services virtually.
- Conduct research on the involvement of volunteers and volunteer-involving-organisations in the COVID-19 response.
- Promote training and webinars from Carlow Volunteer Centre, Sports Partnership, ETB,
 Public Participation Network, Volunteer Ireland, The Wheel and others.
- Organise virtual events for National Volunteer Week that addressed the topic of wellbeing.
- Continue our Transition Year Student programme virtually and promote virtual volunteering opportunities.

- Providing advice and guidance on volunteering safely when dealing with vulnerable members of the public.
- Sharing stories of those volunteering and raising awareness of the positive impact of volunteers.
- Prioritising Garda vetting applications for Covid 19 response.

On behalf of the Board of Carlow Volunteer Centre I would like to thank the staff who had the added task of managing Kilkenny and Wexford VIO's along with Carlow Volunteer Centre during this time. Their commitment, passion and dedication to help their community has been clearly demonstrated throughout this challenging year. The national median for time to first contact is 81% of volunteers contacted in 4 days or under


This document provides i-VOL statistics under 3 main headings:

Time to placement is the median time for a volunteer to begin volunteering. This is measured from the time a volunteer first begins volunteering.


Time to first contact is measured from the time a volunteer first registers until a first activity, task or email is recorded on the volunteer's record.


